

UPDATE ON HABITAT CONSERVATION & MANAGEMENT

While we have made good progress in recent years, the challenges of erosion, heavy use and weather persist and intensify periodically. Work we have done over the fall of 2019 and spring 2020 includes:

- Erosion and Trail Maintenance: We have continued to work with Salt Pond to respond to erosion on both sides of the Knob property and to maintain existing trails.
- Plantings and Fencing: In fall 2019, we continued planting on the harborside ravines and adding cedar fencing at strategic locations on bluffs beside the trails. We will relocate fencing as necessary on eroded banks. We are also planning a major bank-protection effort, using geotextile bags on a length of badly eroded bluff adjacent to the harborside wooden stairs and stone revetment. Early spring beachgrass replanting continues to be on the annual work list.
- Storm Damage: This past year we have had three major storms. Consequently, erosionmitigation efforts will need to continue.
 The storms have also brought with them considerable tree damage. We are limbing large boughs and tree tops to improve appearances near the trails, while leaving the cut remains of blow-downs as habitat.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Members:

Of all the President and Chairman letters that have come to you via this newsletter, none has been offered under such difficult and unusual circumstances. At the time of publication, much of the country is still under lockdown in an effort to slow the coronavirus. However, getting outdoors and exercising can still be part of our lives, provided we do so responsibly. The Knob is available to walk. We ask that you respect both the directives of our Salt Pond Areas Bird Sanctuaries partners and the safety of others by adhering to the social-distancing guidelines posted at the entrance.

While our immediate activities are limited, our vision for the Knob and Quissett Harbor is not. That vision includes repairing the rock armor, fixing the harborside erosion, removing invasive plants, working with our Salt Pond partners to improve the trails and vistas on the Knob as well as safety and signage, achieving the cleanest harbor water quality in all of Buzzards Bay watershed and working with the Town Of Falmouth on engineering and construction on Quissett Harbor Road and the seawall around the Inner Harbor to deal with increasing water levels.

Our immediate priority is to repair the rock armor. I am pleased to tell you that we now have all the permits required. In April the Falmouth Conservation Commission approved our work plan for repairing the Knob.

The cost we have been quoted at this time to make the repairs has come in above our budget. We are optimistic as we work with our engineers, Foth Infrastructure & Environment, LLC, that we will find ways to reduce the cost without compromising the effectiveness of the repairs. We will keep you updated.

As always, we plan a season filled with events and opportunities to learn more about the Knob and the work we do as a community to preserve it. Of course, we will follow the guidance and directives from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and Massachusetts Department of Public Health regarding group gatherings at the time of the events.

Finally I would like to welcome our new board member, Lisa Bernstein, who was voted in at the spring board meeting. And I want to thank Todd Bourell, Chair of the Investment Committee, who is stepping down from the board. Todd has done tremendous work in growing our endowment and protecting the Funds we've raised to repair the rock armor. And while the market is experiencing a downturn at the moment because of the coronavirus, the position of strength Todd helped us create will serve us well when the market rebounds.

WHEELER LECTURE EXPLORES A RIVER-CENTRIC VIEW OF OUR CHANGING PLANET

This year's Wheeler Lecture presenter will be Robert Max Holmes. Ph.D, Deputy Director and Senior Scientist at Woods Hole Research Center. Dr. Holmes is an earth-system scientist who studies rivers and their watersheds and how climate change and other disturbances are impacting the cycles of water and chemicals in the environment. His topic will be A River-Centric View of our Changing Planet. "Just like a physician collects a blood sample to learn about the health of the individual, so too can we collect river water samples to learn about the health of a river and its watershed." Dr. Holmes said.

FINANCES 2019 (JANUARY 1-DECEMBER 31, 2019)

Contributions for annual dues and our projects totaled \$179,752 during calendar-year 2019. In total we've raised \$539,000 for the Rock Armor Project, and we have a pledge of an additional \$50,000 from Salt Pond Areas Bird Sanctuaries. As of April 2020, we have also raised \$80,000 toward removing invasive plants and replanting on land behind the Harbor House and on the pathways of the Knob. Much of our expense in 2019 went toward design, engineering fees and fees working to secure all the permits required.

On April 22 the Trust's Assets were \$1,304,806. Regretfully, during March and April of this year due to the stock market decline we lost \$38,000 of the \$66,000 we earned last year. We have over \$100,000 at Rockland Bank in our operating account and \$700,000 in cash invested with Fidelity. This is reserved for the rock armor repair project construction costs. We have an additional \$500,000 at Fidelity, split between equity and bond funds.
